Current and Upcoming Club Competitions

- **Tonight Digital "Lights at Night".** The image must be of lights at night. Capture stars, fireworks, neon signs, taillights, streetlights, the lights of the city, Christmas lights. The subject of the image should be the lights in their environment or lighting an object such as a Ferris wheel of a Christmas tree. Glen Kindness presenter
- February 14th Print due 1/24 "Juxtaposition/Point-Counterpoint". Juxtaposition photography involves combining two or more elements in the same picture, highlight the interesting contrast between them, to create an eye-catching and thought-provoking image. To create a point of juxtaposition, the picture must contain at least two elements with strong visual weight. Contrasts can be big/small, old/young, light/dark, different textures,

color contrast (use the color wheel), etc. Juxtaposition can also involve a subject in a scene that is out of place where you wouldn't expect to see it.

- February 28th Digital due 2/14 "Conveying Emotions". It can be a person showing emotions of surprise, fear, happiness, etc. or the overall image can convey a feeling or emotion. A blue tone in a winter scene conveys the feeling of cold. Fog creates a moodiness or mystery to an image. To evoke emotion in photography simply means your photos say something. They tell a story—rather than merely creating a record of a place or moment.
- March 13th Print due 2/28 "Light and Shadow". Light makes an image seem brighter while shadow can add drama to a certain part of an image's composition. For great photos, a careful balance is needed. The right balance of light and shadow can help your image by providing dimension or pulling focus. Make sure the contrast of light and shadow is the primary focus of your image. The actual subject is secondary to the light and shadow interplay.
- **Print and Digital Images of the Year** Top two images from each competition in 2023. Winners announced at March 13th meeting. Judge will select winners.
- **Creative Image Competition** Up to two images may be entered "...focusing on creative images and permitting unlimited manipulation and processing techniques." Members vote.

Upcoming Community Call for Artists

- Fitton Center Call to Artists We > Me: 17 Artists Explore Hamilton Neighborhoods. This 2024 FotoFocus Biennial exhibition is a partnership between the Fitton Center and 17STRONG and will be displayed in the Fitton Center for Creative Arts galleries in Fall 2024. The planned group exhibition tells the ongoing story of Hamilton, Ohio, by uniting multiple perspectives and interpretations of the *backstories* through lens-based art. In this project, 17 selected regional artists are assigned, through a lottery process conducted by project organizers, to one of the City of Hamilton's 17 diverse neighborhoods to create visual narratives. In spring and summer of 2024, selected photographers roam their assigned neighborhood to find the aspects, aesthetics and personalities they wish to reveal through their lens-based art.

New Business

- Tax Exempt Status for Club Frank Harrison
 - 501(c)(7) is a nonprofit social club organized for "pleasure, recreation, and other similar purposes."
 - Funding is primarily through membership fees and dues from club members, but up to 35% of gross receipts can be from nonmember sources.
 - Club profits (if any) may not benefit any individual.
 - Must provide opportunities for member social interaction.

- Limited membership, but cannot discriminate on the basis of color, race or religion.
- May be established as a corporation or an unincorporated association.

• Implementation

- Update club by-laws to include statement of non-discrimination (in process).
- Register the club name with the State of Ohio (done).
- Obtain a tax number (E.I.N) from the IRS (request submitted).
- Apply to the IRS for tax-exempt status (TBD).
- o Establish new bank account and transfer club assets from old account.
- File annual returns beginning in January 2025.

• Club Treasurer Responsibilities

- Maintain club financial records in compliance with IRS 501c7 tax-exempt status.
 - File annual statement (Form 990-N a.k.a. e-Postcard) as required by the IRS.
 - Collect membership dues per Article V Section 1 of the club by-laws; notify relevant member and president of delinquency per Article V Section 2 of the by-laws.
 - Maintain club membership records on club website, and communicate names of new and departed members as necessary (e.g. to create member badges or update meeting sign-in list).
 - Pay club expenses and deposit club income (e.g. membership fees) from/to club bank or cash account, as appropriate.
 - Report on club financial condition to club board on a quarterly basis per Article V Section
 3 of the club's by-laws. Advise board in a timely manner on all matters that could impact
 the financial health of the organization.
 - Actively participate in club governance as member of Board of Directors.
 - Ensure designated backup has the knowledge to assume Treasurer duties when necessary.
- **Revisions to Club By-Laws** Motion was made to amend the by-laws with a nondiscrimination clause. Motion made by Audra and seconded by Glen and approved unanimously.
